

# Horticulture – Container and Indoor Gardening

As GCFP Awards Chair, I had the good fortune to read many applications for GCFP/ CAR-SGC/NGC Awards. There were several entries that featured containers: "Winter Seed Sowing" using milk jugs, "Potting Succulents for Mother's Day" and the "Saved Seed Project." Wayne Woods GC (WWGC) of District I (Philadelphia area) of The Garden Club Federation of Pennsylvania provided outstanding learning from container gardening with youth. WWGC sponsored a year-long "Saved Seed Project" to introduce elementary students attending Upper Merion Area School District to basic gardening science concepts while incorporating reading, writing and math into the process. How?



Having been read to by two GC members in October 2018 from the NGC-sponsored book, "The Saved Seed", three second-grade classes of students saved pumpkin seeds from six varieties of 18 GC-donated pumpkins in November. In May 2019, second grade teachers used the seeds for a variety of educational activities in math, writing and science that met PA State Teaching Standards. The standards included:

- measuring and estimating lengths in standard units using appropriate tools,
- identifying similarities and differences in life cycles of plants and animals,
- 3. explaining how different plant parts work together to make a functional organism,
- 4. explaining that living things can only survive if their needs are met, and
- 5. types of writing, specifically writing informational pieces such as descriptions letters, reports, and instructions using illustrations when relevant.



The second graders sowed their "Saved Seeds" in GC-donated peat pots and later transplanted their seedlings to 20 five-gallon buckets, as requested by the school district. The kids witnessed Standard #4 that the pumpkin roots were too large for the buckets, needed daily

watering and could not survive in the buckets! \* It was also too late to transplant all of them into home gardens. In Fall 2019, the pumpkins were to be harvested by the then 3rd graders, completing the cycle. The project and cycle began again with the new second graders reading the book and using donated pumpkins. All this was accomplished for \$159. Talk about getting a lot of mileage from a container garden project! Congratulations for amazing work, President Nancy Cuttic and Gwen Puglisi of Wayne Woods GC! # A Challenge To Gardeners, Conservationists And Naturalists

The noted author and Professor of Entomology, Doug Tallamy, is challenging gardeners to 'turn their backyards into conservation corridors'. In the fall of 2018, Emma Pelton , a biologist with the Xerxes Society for Invertebrate Conservation, saw 86% less butterflies than the year before at the annual Western Monarch Thanksgiving Count. At hundreds of sites volunteers counted 86% fewer than the number of butterflies the year before. The threats to pollinators are as numerous and varied as the species themselves. Directly addressing this is the disappearance and fragmentation of native plant habitats. Every square mile of open land turned to

shopping center or highways is the pollinator equivalent of leveling Manhattan. And for pollinators that migrate like butterflies and many species of hummingbirds, habitat loss is occurring all along their range. The loss of pollinators is part of a larger pattern of huge decreases in the volume of insects. The fates of pollinators and their host plants are intertwined.

It may sound far-fetched, but the truth is every living thing has an important place in our planet's web of life. So every little bit that we as gardeners, conservationists or naturalists can, do helps the environment, wildlife and the planet. In the words of Doug Tallamy from his latest book, "Nature's Best Hope", he states that "Man is Nature's Best Hope".

If you do not already have one, States and Clubs should set up a Native Plant or Tree Chairman. You could also appoint someone to be your tree counter. See how many trees your clubs, organizations and membership can plant. Let your State's Chair know. Get your totals and let the Region and NGC know.

Let's see just how many native trees get planted in our Region in just one year. I think we will be surprised.

# CAR-SGC Scholarship Patronage Program

CAR-SGC is announcing a new Scholarship Patronage Program. Each year the CAR-SGC awards one academic scholarship to a student who meets the National Garden Club, Inc. criteria for student scholarships. In order to sustain this program, and perhaps enlarge it to award a second annual scholarship, CAR-SGC is launching a new Scholarship Patronage Program to encourage individuals to make annual donations to the CAR-SGC Scholarship Fund.

This program is in addition to the Life Membership program, which continues. Proceeds from the Life Membership program also go to the Scholarship Fund

Under the patronage program, club members who donate regularly will be recognized at the annual CAR-SGC fall conference and in the Members Only section of the CAR-SGC website.

The patronage program has four donation categories with special recognition for annual donations in five consecutive years and 10 consecutive years:

Platinum Donor annual donation of \$1,000 or more

Gold Donor annual donation of \$500-\$999
Silver Donor annual donation of \$200-\$499
Bronze Donor annual donation of \$50-\$199

After 5 consecutive years at a donor level one oak-leaf cluster

After 10 consecutive years at a donor level two oak-leaf clusters

Any donation of \$5,000 or more shall be recognized as a Diamond Donation.

Donations received during the year before August 30 will be acknowledged at the conference following August 30. Diamond, platinum, gold and silver donors will be recognized during a conference meal. All donors will be listed in the conference program. The Members Only section of the website will be updated regularly to recognize donors at all levels.

Because the IRS recognizes CAR-SGC as a 501c3 charity, all donations to CAR-SGC, including donations to the scholarship fund, are tax deductible as charitable contributions.

Donations may be made easily on the CAR-SGC website via PayPal, in care of the CAR-SGC treasurer Mary Williford. They may also be made by check payable to CAR-SGC with Scholarship noted on the For line. ## **Penny Pines**

The importance of the Penny Pines Program is becoming more apparent with the loss of many forested areas due to the introduction of several new pests into our region and continued urban sprawl. Carol Hall, Garden Club Federation of Pennsylvania Penny Pines Chairman, shared how funding from GCFP garden clubs has helped with the replanting of the Allegheny National Forest over the past several years. She noted that projects for 2020 include the maintenance and enhancement of seven Allegheny National Forest native plant pollinator gardens utilizing the Youth Conservation Corps. Additionally, herbaceous plants, trees, and shrub plantings will occur at several developed recreation areas for future shade and wildlife habitats. Wildlife openings will also be planted with a variety of shrub and herbaceous species to enhance these habitats. This is only one example of how the Penny Pines Reforestation Program is helping to plant America here in the Central Atlantic Region. I hope to share other reforestation projects in future CAR Review articles.
